I would like to thank our resolute staff, parents and loyal community partners in Shasta, Siskiyou, and Trinity Counties for making this a successful year.



Federal & State Reviews

- ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH AND SAFETY REVIEW: From 4/20/2015 to 4/24/2015, the Administration for Children and Families conducted an Environmental Health and Safety review event for Shasta County Head Start Child Development, Inc. Based on the information gathered, no area of non-compliance was found during the course of the review.
- ◆ STATE REVIEW: From 5/9/2023 to 5/12/2023, the California Department of Social Services conducted an overall program review of the CCTR program including: fiscal, governance, administration, involvement, staffing, professional development, teaching and learning. No areas of non compliance was noted during the review.
- **FOCUS AREA ONE REVIEW:** From 11/18/2019 to 11/22/2019 the Head Start Focus Area One Review was conducted by the Office of Head Start. The review was conducted through a series of interviews with management staff discussing program design, management, and governance structure to the Federal Reviewer. Based on the information gathered, **no area of non-compliance** was found during the course of the review.
- CLASS REVIEW: From 2/03/2020 to 2/8/2020, the Administration for Children and Families observed preschool center-based classrooms using the Classroom Assessment Scoring System. The tool looks at three domains and ten dimensions of teacher-child interactions and measures those observed interactions on a seven point scale. Based on the information gathered, no area of non-compliance was found during the course of the review.
- FOCUS AREA TWO REVIEW: From 1/25/2021 to 1/29/2021, the Head Start Focus Area Two Review was conducted by the Office of Head Start. The review was conducted through a series of interviews with staff, parents, and board of directors discussing sick areas of discussion: program design, management, and quality improvement; education and child development services; health program services, family and community engagement; fiscal infrastructure; and eligibility, recruitment, selection, enrollment, and attendance. Based on the information gathered, no area of non-compliance was found during the course of the review.


Actual expenditures and revenue for fiscal year 2022-2023 were \$17,997,167 compared to the budget of \$20,603,505. Expenditures consist of personnel, travel, equipment, supplies, and contractual cost necessary for the operation of a Head Start program. All expenditures for the fiscal year met the cost requirement set forth in CFR 45 Part 75.

The Financial Audit for Fiscal Year 2023 was completed with no reportable findings.

In 2022-2023, a total of **498** children and families were served, the average monthly enrollment was **56%**, and an estimated **22%** of eligible children and families in our service area were served.

Program Options

Shasta Head Start offers several program choices with varied schedules to meet the needs of families in our community.

- The Early Head Start Infant Toddler option serves pregnant mothers, infants and toddlers from birth to three in our early learning centers. This option operates part day or full day, five days a week and is a full year program. Early Head Start also offers infant toddler home visiting options for families that prefer services in their home with weekly home visits of approximately 1.5 hours, and play groups.
- The Head Start Preschool option serves children ages three to five years of age in our early learning centers, and operates part day or full day five days a week, for part year or full year. Some of our preschool centers offer transportation as well.
- The Early Head Start Child Care Partnership option offers extended day child care for Early Head Start children up to the age of four in a comfortable home environment. Our current Family Child Care Providers have extensive Early Childhood experience and education, and several are currently accredited with the National Association of Family Child Care.









Disabilities & Mental Health

Children with disabilities or mental health concerns are encouraged to participate in SHS program services. Appropriate accommodations, enhancements, and support is provided as needed for each child.

Health & Nutrition

All families participating in the program are encouraged to complete required medical and dental exams through health care and oral health care professionals. Every child in the program receives a nutritional evaluation upon entry to determine individual nutritional needs.

Percentage of enrolled children that received a medical exam: 97%

Percentage of enrolled children ages 3-5 that completed dental exams: 77%

Family Engagement

Family engagement is a vital component in the structure and function of the Head Start program. Families are involved in program governance, program planning, curriculum development, child homework, and personal development. Family Workers and Home Visitors partner with families to establish individualized family goals, and support families in accomplishing their goals. Parent Engagement Activities

One of Shasta Head Start's primary goals is to encourage families to participate in their child's education as well as in their own personal growth and development. Shasta Head Start offers both Parent Meetings and Parenting Groups. Parent Meetings provide opportunities for families to build supportive relationships. Make Parenting A Pleasure is an evidence-based parenting curriculum that is effective in improving outcomes for stressed families and is the curriculum used to facilitate Parenting Groups. Parenting Groups and Playgroups/Socials are focused on enhancing relationships, practicing positive communication skills, and promoting healing.

- 275 Parents/Guardians received parenting education.
- 122 father/father figures participated in program activities.
- 2,445 resources/referrals/education was provided to families.
- 4 Parent meetings were offered at each center.
- Make Parenting a Pleasure Parenting Groups were offered.
- 2 playgroups/socials were offered each month for our Home Base program.


School Readiness Goals

School readiness goals are determined by the agency for each age group. Children are assessed three times per year using the State of California DRDP rating tool. The following depicts the school readiness goal outcomes over the Fall 2022, Winter 2022-23, and Spring 2023 rating periods, and the percentage of children who met or exceeded school readiness expectations by measure for their age.

Total Number of Assessments:

- Fall 2022: **162** infants and toddlers, **164** preschoolers
- Winter 2022-23: **175** infants and toddlers, **183** preschoolers
- Spring 2023: **179** infants and toddlers, **184** preschoolers


Preschool School Readiness Expectations by Measure
